Quote

The authors exact wording

Run-in quotation

A few words or a sentence Use quotation marks

Horror films often examine the "relative and fragile nature" of humanity and what it means to exist (Wells 2000, p. 9).

A separate block with indentation

The horror genre is constantly changing to reflect the fears of contemporary society. In modern horror films a commonly occurring theme is how fragile human life is and the question if humanity is going to survive. As Paul Wells puts it:

The horror genre has become increasingly concerned with the relative and fragile nature of existence. (Wells 2000, p. 9)

Writing references

Last name, year and page number inside brackets after the quote/paraphrase

Examples:

- One author, one page (Anderson 1997, p. 121)
- Two authors, two pages (Anderson & Smith 1998, pp. 31-32)
- More than two authors, more than two pages (Anderson et al. 1995, pp. 236-245)



Writing references

Name and year can be excluded if written in the text

No name and no year in the text

- Year
- Title and subtitle in italics
- Edition (not if it's the first edition)
- Place of publication (town or city)
- Publisher
